SLP advocates provide eligible seniors with legal representation at hearings or in court. Advocates are also available to meet with community groups to provide education and discuss legal issues affecting seniors.

Lawyers and Paralegals on the Senior Law Project help seniors with various civil matters affecting individuals 60 years and older.



***The following legal problems are among those typically faced by our clients:***

- ◆ Consumer Debt Collection/ Financial Exploitation
- ◆ Housing/ Property Taxes
- ◆ Nursing Home/ Assisted Living Transfer/Discharge
- ◆ Social Security Denials
- ◆ Medicaid Denials

---

**Consumer Debt Collection/ Financial Exploitation:**

- ◆ Harassing phone calls and/or letters from debt collectors
- ◆ Unfair and deceptive practices by debt collector
- ◆ Lawsuits filed by creditors or debt collectors
- ◆ Protected income exempt from collection: e.g. Social Security/SSI benefits, unemployment compensation, and more
- ◆ Improper use of an elder's funds or property

---

**Housing /Property Taxes:**

- ◆ Evictions/ Unsafe Conditions
- ◆ Housing Discrimination Issues
- ◆ Section 8 or Public Housing Terminations/Denials
- ◆ Mortgage Foreclosure
- ◆ Mobile Home Park Issues
- ◆ Property Tax Relief

**Nursing Home/Assisted Living:**

- ◆ Nursing home/assisted living residents' rights
- ◆ Transfers or discharges from a current facility

**Public Benefits:**

- ◆ Social Security/SSI
- ◆ State Disability Benefits (APTD)

- ◆ Unemployment Compensation
